Spread over 26.42 Acres of land, founded amidst the lap of nature, having long elms to provide shade to all the sojourners, humming of the birds adding to mirth and joy to the experience of learning, the very old building standing like a colossus presenting a marvel of architectural design of past glory, creates a serene ambience where quest for learning makes this college the natural choice of the surrounding area.

Equipped with remarkable infrastructural facilities, the strength of the college lies in its magnificent legacy of conquering new forts in the arena of academics, sports as well as extracurricular activities. What adds to its grandeur is a unique blend of heritage structure with new buildings having latest designs. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Needless to say it is the curricular aspect which is the essence of any educational institution. In absence of a well fortified backbone, how can the body of any institution claim to compete with eternity. If any educational institution aspires to remain relevant, it needs to constantly maintain its curricular fundamentals and we have been regularly doing it in the most conscientious and conspicuous manner. When it comes to academics, all the courses which we offer are taught complying with the parameters set by affiliating university. Every endeavor is ensured to fulfill all university syllabus norms in theory and practical subjects. All the teachers ensure to collect assignments and conduct MST of students as per university conditions. The stress is always to encourage students to assimilate knowledge, not just memorizing certain facts to score marks. New courses are added from time to time keeping in mind emerging needs of industry and real market. The students apart from being taught in classes are also taken to the field as per directions of university or state government. Moreover, in order to make our academic fundamentals strong, we keep on adding to our already rich collection of books every year by utilizing grants from the UGC/ state Government or from our own resources as per availability of

wherewithal. 'The Ranbir', a college magazine, is published every year. Students themselves are editors of these sections. We have also been conducting remedial classes as per UGC guidelines subject to availability of such grants. Though the curriculum is designed by the university, the goals and objectives of the college are transmitted to the students by teaching beyond the curriculum and classroom. Following the principle of 'Seeing is believing', the college encourages students to go on educational Tours and field visits. We keep on conducting extension lectures to enrich our students. ICT tools are also integrated in the teaching-learning process. Online platforms are also used to teach students. **YouTube** channels are also utilized by staff to teach students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The quality of teaching is a matter of paramount importance for any educational institution. We are no exception to this regard. Every effort is ensured to fulfill all set as of various courses as per norms of central and state government. Students are taught in a manner so they may have real time knowledge and information of ongoing events and changes in society with greater stress on their communication skill. All integrated parameters of syllabus set by affiliating universities are met in letter and spirit. Even in times of corona epidemic, we taught students online fulfilling all syllabus related norms of university. The whole teachinglearning process is evaluated by college administration led by the principal through various means so that no loophole is left unaddressed. Before the start of the session, the college Principal calls the meetings of the Prospectus Committee and College Website Committee which updates all information regarding admissions, availability of seats, fee structures, concessions or scholarships to be given to students. Parents are also informed about the admission procedure. The decision about the seats in different courses is taken by the college council in consultation with the heads of the departments. In some courses like B.Com, BCA, BBA, Hospitality Diploma Courses, B.Sc Medical and Non-Medical, Post Graduate Courses and also in the subject of Physical Education, seats are fixed by the university. Admission is done purely on merit basis and according to the instructions and rules laid by the Punjab Govt. Students with physical disabilities, with rural schooling and students with extra unique talent are given admissions over and above the total seats but strictly in accordance with the notification of Punjab Govt. / Punjabi University, Patiala. Apart from taking regular class tests, unit tests, House exams, assignments, internal assessment, the college takes special care of the economically weak and academically slow students. Remedial Classes are arranged to help such students. Admissions in all classes and streams is done by forming proper Admission Committees. One senior member is appointed as its convener. There are Admission Coordinators for addressing complaints, grievances and corrections, if any.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research work is one of the most sacrosanct parameters of any educational institution. Higher the quality of research it undertakes and performs, higher is the quality it deserves to boast of. For us, research is our topmost priority. The college promotes the value of research work among the faculty members. Teaching faculty is encouraged to do Ph. D. A considerable number of our faculty members are already having degrees of doctorate and many more are pursuing their Ph.D. Besides that, majority of our faculty members regularly attend seminars and read their research papers there. The college is proud of its achievements in imparting its social duties. In order to sensitize its students on issues such as gender and environment, the college has Women Welfare Cell, Environment Awareness Society, Legal Literacy Club, Anti Narcotic Club and Road Safety Committee etc which organizes activities and awareness lectures for the students throughout the year. The college enrolls students (both girls and boys) under NCC, NSS and Red Cross also. Various extension activities to raise the awareness level of the students as well as public consciousness are organized by the college.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

As far as infrastructure is concerned, we can boast of having done a lot in this area. Courtesy to huge grants of Rusa and state Govt. grants, we have been able to achieve a lot and substantially improve our infrastructure from all perspectives. It has been a monumental decade for us in which we almost got 2 Crore rupees through Rusa in which we worked on components of Infrastructure (New construction, Renovation and Equipments), Equity and MMER. We have undertaken a huge step of renovating the old and dilapidated buildings of the college and constructed many new blocks leading to further consolidation of college infrastructure. In addition to that we have been granted 75 Lakh by the state government under H.E 24 Scheme to make further improvements in our infrastructure. In addition to that we have also constructed a new classroom block Shri Guru Teg Bahadur Block out of HEIS funds. We have made incredibly wonderful progress in the direction of interconnecting passages of college which have been thoroughly laid with interlocking tiles giving college an ultra-modern look. The heritage structure of college is well preserved. Several roofs of dilapidated rooms have been repaired by PWD in order to provide a secure atmosphere to students, and a large number of CCTV cameras have been installed in college. A new washroom block adjacent to the geography department has been constructed in the college. Cracked stand of college has been widened to coer more cycles keeping in mind future needs of students. Colour coating has been also done of majority of buildings. Landscaping has been also given more contemporary looks. The college has well equipped laboratories for the department of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Geography and Home Science. It has several computer labs with Wi-Fi connectivity. We have an Edusat room for online learning. We also have a Language Lab.. We are also having several smart classrooms in order to cater new needs of students. A new library equipped with state of art technology is built at cost of 2 Crore.

Student Support and Progression

The college admits students from all sections of the society irrespective of class, religion, caste, area and provides secular and liberal education. The college reserved seats in admission as per norms of government. To enhance the quality education for the underprivileged students, many scholarships, concessions are given to them. Students belonging to SC categories not only get post-matric scholarships by the Govt., their fee and funds are totally reimbursed by the Social Welfare Department of the State. All eligible students can avail this scheme. Economically backward students are also waived PTA funds. Girls students from economically weaker classes are given aid from Student Aid Fund and Red Cross Fund. The college offers monetary help to the needy sports persons also.

Apart from monetary support, the college supports students in distress. There is a Women Cell in the college which gives counseling to girl students and listens to their problems. The Placement Cell also supports students in career choices and helps to make decisions about their career. The Youth coordinator involves all the students in various activities like theater, mimicry, dance, singing, folk dance etc not only to release stress but also to compete in various activities. We also have an Alumni Association that keeps helping the students from time to time. Last year the Ranbir Alumni Club gave awards to the best academic and sports achievers. Many scholarships and awards have been nominated by our Ex (Retired) faculty.

The self financed courses have offered new professional opportunities to the students. The department of hospitality has really changed the lives of our students by helping them get placed in the best hotels in some of the most prominent cities of Punjab. The certificate courses of Jagat Guru Nanak Dev Open University have opened new vistas for students. The industrial tours of Career counseling cells have become a milestone for our

college. The camps of NSS and NCC have added a new spirit of compassion, service and brotherhood in our students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college is committed to providing leadership and direction to its students in every sphere of enterprise and endeavor. There is a culture of team spirit in our college. All decisions are taken in consultation with the HODs and Conveners of the activities. Principal is assisted by a college council which consists of senior most faculty members. IQAC plays a vital role in monitoring, planning and implementing the decisions taken. Under the effective administrative leadership, each employee is accountable for whatever he / she does. A decentralized and collective participation is the policy of college. The various administrative committees like Library Committee, Examination Committee, Committee For Cultural Activities, Career Guidance And Placement Cell, Drinking Water, Water Cooler And Water Supply Committee, Electricity Committee And Sound Committee, Property Maintenance Committee, College Campus Beautification Committee bring more efficiency and transparency to functioning of college.

There are Incharges / Conveners of Activities / Clubs / Societies like Youth Coordinator, Program Officer, NCC Incharge. All the staff members have been involved in decision making and their implementation. Professional Development of its Teaching and Non-teaching staff is encouraged. Faculty participates in Seminars / Workshops / Orientation Courses and Refresher Courses. There is provision for a public addressing system. College premises are utilized for conducting University Examinations and are also available for other competitive exams. The College acts as Nodal College for institutions of Sangrur District for Direct Beneficiary Scheme Of Post-Matric Scholarship and coordinates with other Govt. Colleges in the district. The College building is chosen for elections, voting, counting during Panchayat Elections, Municipality Elections and Assembly elections and for Parliament Elections also.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

When it comes to values, we are second to none. From time immemorial, Govt Ranbir College has served a nursery of humanitarian values. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	Being a leading fully government educational institution of the area, the college is already offering multidisciplinary courses to its students from streams of arts, science, commerce and diploma in food and bakery, computer courses like BBA, BCA, PGDCA, hospitality courses and other certificate courses. As far as other preparations regarding flexible and innovative curriculum are concerned, it is clarified that being a Govt. college and affiliated with a state university, we do not have any sovereign power to introduce any new change until the government or affiliated university instructs us to do the same.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The pedagogical approach of the institution is students' centric where the faculties' pedagogical approaches are constructivist, inquiry based, reflective and collaborative. The institution has implemented ABC according to the guidelines of the affiliated university and approval form the regulating bodies. The faculty members have sensitized the students regarding the need and benefits of registering for ABC. A special committee is formed to register all the students for ABC. More than 80 percent of the students have already registered and the institution will get all the students registered on the portal.
3. Skill development:	Skill development is the compass guiding personal growth. It is the art of refining abilities, nurturing talents, and embracing continuous learning. With dedication and practice it transforms potential into proficiency opening doors to new opportunities and shaping a more capable versatile self. In order to promote and enhance skill development in the students various Skill based short term certificate and diploma courses have been introduced. Students have been getting benefits of learning Creative writing, Content development, Software Programming and Fashion Designing etc. The Hospitality Department of the college offers certificate course Bakery and Confectionary, Food and Beverages. The students also go for training and internship for the practical knowledge. Besides this, the college also organizes various skill development workshops to enhance the skill of the students from time to time. The interests of the students are identified and extension lectures for Career Counselling are organized accordingly.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The integration of India's vast knowledge system involves honouring its ancient wisdom in fields like Yoga, Astronomy and Philosophy alongside modern advancements. This fusion fosters holistic approaches to healthcare, sustainability, and technology creating a bridge between tradition and innovation fostering a rich tapestry of knowledge for the benefit of humanity. The college is using several ways to promote and integrate the Indian knowledge system among its students through the curriculum. The college curriculum includes courses which are specifically focused on Indian Knowledge systems

	like Philosophy, history, Science and languages. Curriculum related books are available in all the three mediums in college library. The faculty is encouraged to participate and attend multi-disciplinary trainings and workshops to enhance their understanding and teaching of Indian knowledge system. Sanskrit, History and Philosophy are taught as optional subjects in the college which contain vast knowledge and information about the Indian knowledge system. The college celebrates International Yoga Day. Yoga camps are organised in college on routine basis. The college also offers Music Instrument as elective subject to promote and train students to learn folk instruments and folk songs.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Outcome-based education is a structured approach emphasizing specific results and skills over rote training. It aims to tailor education to measurable outcomes, ensuring students acquire applicable knowledge and abilities for real world scenarios. By centring on results, it aligns learning objectives with practical skill development, nurturing a more holistic and applicable educational experience. Our college implements outcome-based education by clearly defining learning objectives, aligning curriculum with these goals, regularly assessing students' performance and adjusting teaching methods to ensure students achieve those desired outcomes. It involves setting specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time bound goals for students' learning experiences. A specific programme and course is set for the outcome that is clearly mentioned in the syllabus prescribed by the affiliating university under the semester system. The unitization of the syllabus is done in the beginning of the session. The students are assessed on the basis of their tests, assignments, group discussions and finally in their university papers. The practical exams are conducted as part of their curriculum. Interactive extension lectures are organized and field trips are also conducted as per requirement of the course.
6. Distance education/online education:	Online teaching during the Pandemic became the lifeline of education, bridging physical distances through digital platforms. It transformed classrooms into virtual spaces, offering both challenges and opportunities for educators and students to adapt, innovate and learn in unprecedented way. The shift underscored the importance of technology in

education, fostering resilience and creativity in the face of adversity. The college set an example of excellence by organizing classes and conducting examination through completely online mode. The teachers employed various strategies to manage online classes and tests by staying in contact with their students through Whats App groups. They utilized video conferencing tools like Zoom, Google Meet for live lectures. The faculty members recorded their lectures and shared with the students who missed their classes for some reasons. Some faculty members are still active on You Tube channels to impart knowledge. They have started training students to prepare for competitive exams. The college has started skill based short term courses in blended mode so that large number of students can get benefit of these courses.

1.-Government Ranbir College Sangrur is a co-educational institution of higher learning affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala. The curriculum planning and delivery at the institution is well structured ensuring the holistic development of the students.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well- planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment. The college strives and adopts several initiatives in a well planned and documented way for effective curriculum delivery. Year planner is chalked out at the commencement of every session adhering to the Academic Calendar issued by Punjabi University, Patiala. According to the exam schedule of the affiliating university, the college adjusts the academic calendar for the internal examination and other add – on courses. The departments prepare academic calendars well in advance for ensuing academic sessions. The calendar carries a tentative schedule related to the admission process, commencement of class schedule, co-curricular and extra- curricular activities, major departmental and institutional events to be organized and the schedule of the summer and winter vacations. The college, thereby, follows this calendar for conducting internal evaluation tests.

There is a continuous process of internal evaluation of the students on the basis of their attendance, performance, assignments, unit tests and classroom discussions. Some of the other activities are also organized from time to time to upgrade the knowledge of the subject such as quiz, presentations, seminars, educational trips and other practical aids. Seminars, conferences, extension lectures, workshops etc. are also organized in order to provide a platform to the students to interact with academicians of repute and enhance their knowledge.

The principal holds regular meetings of the HODs and other committee members to discuss the problems related to academics and student grievances. The designated examination committee works on the slots reserved in the academic calendar for internal evaluation tests and displays the date-sheet well in advance for the Mid Term Tests. Each department prepares its separate teaching plan, Calendar and unitization of the prescribed syllabus is done keeping in mind the schedule of the internal evaluation and ensures the completion of the course in accordance with the University examination pattern. All the instructions regarding university syllabus are strictly followed. The syllabuses are shared with students.

The progress of the delivery of the curriculum is regularly monitored by taking feedback from the stakeholders and necessary corrections are made from time to time to improve the overall performance. The college ensures for adopting traditional as well as modern teaching methods to make the learning process more engaging and enticing. Students are also taught online on platforms like YouTube channels by a few teachers. ICT tools are also integrated in imparting education to students. Time tables are rigorously followed university syllabus.

Response:

The college follows the syllabus designed by the affiliated university and therefore integrates and takes effective measures to supplement the syllabus with the core values relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability. Human Resource Management, Governance, Ethics and Social Responsibility of Business form a part of the syllabi for commerce students. Students read extensively on topics like liberty, equality, justice and human rights in the discipline of Political Science. Esteemed personalities are invited to deliver talks on human and moral values. Presentations, slogan writing and quiz competitions are organized to commemorate the martyrs and social reformers to encourage the students to follow their trodden paths. International Yoga Day is celebrated with full enthusiasm to imbibe a sense of positivity among students and the faculty members. Students are encouraged to become members of NSS, NCC, Red Ribbon Club and First Aid Committees and other organizations which inculcate the spirit of social service and patriotism in them. The issues relating gender equality, women empowerment, gender identity, gender discrimination, women rights in society are dealt extensively in the syllabi of a few subjects. Committees like Women Welfare, Prevention of Sexual Harassment Cell, Gender Equity Society and Anti Ragging Committee, are constituted for the effective redressal of the grievances of the students. The college has received grants from RUSA for maintaining gender equity. The grant has been used for curtains in Girls' common room, installation of water coolers with water purifiers at various places in college premises.

The college organizes various lectures to sensitize the students relating to gender issues, female diseases like breast cancer and cervix cancer, etc. Poster making competitions and quiz competitions are also organized on the International Women Day celebration. The college also has the legacy to celebrate "Dheeyyan di Lohri" almost every year. Departments like NCC, NSS, Youth Welfare and Physical Education promote the participation of girl students in various activities. Girl students have represented

at zonal, Inter-Zonal, State and National Levels in various events and have won medals and awards.

The subjects like Environmental Science and Drug Abuse have been included as compulsory subjects at the undergraduate level for all streams to make the students aware about the various drug abuses and problems related to environment pollution and to save it from further degeneration. Besides, the college has constituted Campus Beautification, Landscaping and Environment Awareness committee. Planting saplings in the college campus is a regular feature in the campus. Whatsapp groups, E- mails and digital notices are used to minimize the use of paper. Interlocking tiles have been laid at various places in the college to maintain a clean and green campus.

Besides, a committee has been constituted for the disabled or differently-abled students. Facilities like ramps and wheel chairs have been provided in the campus for the needy students. Anti –Narcotic Club and Road Safety committees are also set up for the for sanitizing students about wearing safety belts, helmets and other road signs while driving.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The faculty of the college is well qualified dedicated and makes all efforts to make the learning process student centric by combining traditional, modern as well as possible several innovative methods. The college has well equipped Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Physics and Computer laboratories to impart wider understanding of the theoretical concepts with the help of practical methods. Teachers also use multimedia aids (Power point Presentations etc.) in their classes to increase the retention power of the students. Post graduate students are also motivated to deliver seminars using power point presentation. Movies and audio lectures are also shared in their groups to give a better understanding of the subject. Internet/ Wi-Fi facility is also provided in some blocks of the campus (Library, HEIS, Administration Block, RUSA) which enables the teachers use internet and keep themselves updated of the latest developments. For encouraging creativity in students, the teachers use tools of information and communication technology. Computer labs with interactive boards, language laboratory and well equipped science laboratories are used. The faculty also organized live online classes on various platforms like Zoom, Google Meet etc during corona. Recorded lecture are also delivered to students in their Whatsapp groups. Students are motivated to raise questions, put doubts, participate in class discussions and give feedback on class lectures. This is how they develop confidence and analytical skills to articulate themselves. Industrial visits and training programmes are also organized for the students of professional degree courses so that they can have both theoretical and practical knowledge.

The college has a seminar hall and multi-purpose auditorium to organize the extension lectures and workshops. Guest lectures, seminars and workshops are conducted from time to time to keep the students updated in their respective subjects and fields. The faculty organizes declamation contests, debates, group discussion; quiz competitions, paper and poster-presentation competitions to increase the student participation. The teachers encourage students to give seminars in the classrooms on different topics which enhance their presentation skills, boost their confidence and also provide a better understanding of their subjects. Educational tours are also organized for the students of all streams for their overall development.

Students are given assignments to develop their writing skills. Students from Science, Commerce, Department of Hospitality and BBA attend training programmes and go for internships in various companies as per their curriculum. Students are also prepared to face the job interviews in the mock interview sessions in classroom teaching. Students are also motivated to give lectures in the class to increase their communication skills. Workshops and guest lectures are conducted by Career Counseling and Placement Cell to create awareness among students regarding job avenues. The faculty also takes care of the students having problems related to the academics by taking remedial classes of the slow learners if grant is available.

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is

time- bound and efficient

Response:

The institute follows the conducts internal evaluation as prescribed by Punjabi University, Patiala. The concerned faculty members evaluate the students on the basis of their overall performance. The college has adopted effective measures to make the mechanism of internal evaluation transparent.

The students are made aware of the assessment criteria in the classroom at the commencement of the session. The university assigned fixed marks for internal assessment for each course. The students are assessed and evaluated for internal assessment on the basis of their attendance in the classrooms, their class performance, assignments, class tests and marks in their MSTs etc. The faculty follows transparent and robust criteria for the internal assessment. Students are given assignments well in advance and timely submission of the assignments is ensured by the concerned teachers. 75% attendance is made compulsory for each student to get his or her admit card for the examination. Date sheet is displayed on the notice boards well in advance for the students to prepare for their house examination. Two mid semester exams are conducted following the pattern of the university exams. These tests are evaluated within the limited time, marks are conveyed to the students and answer sheets are also given to the students to make them aware of their mistakes and improve on the weaker areas for better marks. The students who score well and attain first, second and third position are awarded in the annual function. Weak students are given special attention and remedial classes are organized for their better performance if grant available. Besides house exams and assignments, class tests and surprise tests are also conducted to evaluate the performance of the students. Each faculty member prepares internal assessment of the students and HODs ensure the submission of internal assessment which is further uploaded on the university portal by the faculty members. Record of the mid semester examination is maintained by the registrar committee in the college office.

The college deals with all grievances related to examination in timely and efficient manner. The college ensures to get the university examination forms filled by the students well in time. The date sheet of house examination and university examination is displayed on the notice board well in advance. Grievances at the college level are discussed and redressed by the principal. Students and parents are free to meet the principal for any grievance or information related to academics or examination.

Bachelor in Commerce provides career opportunities in the domain of Industry, Banking, Insurance Companies, Accountancy etc. Students can also appear for various competitive exams and become entrepreneurs of the future by gaining confidence from the practical sessions in their prescribed course.

Bachelor in Science (Medical/ Non Medical) prepare students to get jobs in chemical Industries, teaching, Laboratories etc.

Placement Cell provides ample campus placement opportunities and guides the students in choosing the right career. At undergraduate level, students are offered courses like Home Science, Computer Application etc. which provide hands-on training as part of their curriculum. In some post-graduate courses students are motivated to write papers which further help them to pursue higher studies like M.Phil. and Ph.D.

State Govt. also organizes job fairs for the placement of the students in various private and public sectors. Various companies with a number of job vacancies offer job letters to qualified students and they are given training in respective fields. College remains constantly in touch with the District Bureau of Employment Exchange at the local level which also helps in the placement of students from time to time.

Response:

The institution established in 1939 accommodates more than three thousand students every year in various UG, PG, Diploma and other Add on Courses. The college has adequate number of classrooms, labs, library and computers to cater to the teaching learning needs. In the due course of time, the college has improved all the facilities for

the enhancement of teaching and learning. Classroom furniture is renovated from time to time and new furniture is installed as per requirement, new white boards/green boards/interactive boards/digital panels have been installed. College Development Council and administration make continuous efforts to enhance the infrastructure of the college for effective teaching. The college has received grants from UGC, RUSA and Punjab government for the construction and other facilities in the college.

There are more than 50 spacious rooms accommodating around 50 to 100 students per room. ICT tools are also used forgraduate as well as post graduate students.

There are well equipped laboratories in Science departments. The Department of Physics has two labs and one dark room for performing experiments. The Department of Chemistry has two labs and one room for storing chemicals and instruments. The Department of Botany and Zoology also have two labs with various specimens, microscopes, ovens and dissecting microscopes. The department of Zoology has a museum with a collection of preserved animals. The department of Botany has a well maintained Botanical garden with medicinal plants and herbs. The department of computer science has four labs with latest software tools. Physical department has well maintained ground and Yoga Room for indoor and outdoor activities. Department of Home science is well equipped with all necessary articles needed to perform various practicals.

A new library building is completed housing more than 70,000 books on various subjects. In order to help the needy students, free book bank facility is also maintained. The library has uploaded books on KOHA software. Internet facility is also provided in the library to make the e-content accessible to students and staff. The library hall is spacious and well lighted to create reading ambience.

The college has special ICT facilities equipped Seminar hall with a sitting capacity of 100 students. A multipurpose hall/ Auditorium, playground for sports and cultural activities forms a part of the co-curricular facilities in the college. A well maintained playground is used for training students for various

games, holding Athletic Meet, Inter College tournaments, matches and NCC parade. The winners of various sports events are awarded for their distinguished performance and are given cash prizes and fee scholarships.

The college has well established Youth Welfare Department for preparing students for Youth Festivals and other co-curricular activities. Talent hunt is organized every year for the selection of the students to participate in University Zonal and Inter-Zonal youth festival. Many students have bagged positions at Zonal and Inter-Zonal levels and college has won overall championship in youth festival. Various departments maintain their departmental library.

CCTV cameras are installed at key locations for the safety and security of the campus along with security guards at the college gate. Generator with a capacity of 63KVA is also installed for the power backup.

Besides, the campus provides facility of clean drinking water to every student. Water coolers with water purifiers are installed at various points in college for the safe drinking water facility.

assessment Performa, provided by DPI (colleges)Punjab, is dully filled

by the faculty members every year.

For Overall assessment, faculty members are assigned supplementary (additional) activities besides academics in terms of duties and responsibilities. These kinds of activities become a record of their academic administrative, professional and co-curricular activities. Increments and Promotions are based on the annual confidential reports evaluation. The faculty members are informed well in advance of their due promotion. It is also based on the performance evaluation of a teacher.

NON-TEACHING STAFF:

Through ACR (Annual Confidential Reports) and APA (Annual Performance Appraisal), all nonteaching staff is also evaluated. Staff members are evaluated under various grades i.e. Excellent, very good, good, highly satisfactory, satisfactory, average, and poor. These grades are judged through various traits i.e. characters and habits, departmental abilities, ability to do work, discipline, reliability, relations, cooperation with superiors/ subordinates/colleagues/students, and public and technical abilities.

Other welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff are detailed below:-

Child Care Leave:- Child Care Leave is granted to female Government employees to look after their children till 18 years of age to meet their needs like exams, and sickness as per the Government of Punjab.

Maternity Leave:- Faculty are also granted maternity leave as per Government of Punjab rules.

Leave Travel Concession:- Teaching and Non-teaching Staff avail of Leave Travel Concession as per Government and University rules according to their individual entitlement.

Medical Reimbursement:- The college offers Medical Reimbursement faculty for all permanent employees (Teaching and Non-teaching Staff.

Penion:- Retired faculty and non-teaching staff receive a pension as per Punjab Government rules.

6. NCC:-

NCC Army wing under 4PB. Girls BN Patiala, organizes regular parades with the support of BN Cadets, takes part in camps, Certificate Exams etc. Cadets of the wing also participated in shooting completition held at Bhawanigarh Shooting Range.

Facilities For Women On Campus:

.2 Title-Self Help Group (HUNAR)

1. Objective

The purpose of this practice is to generate handcraft skills in students. Alongside their study, the students can expertise some daily household chores and then further strengthen themselves in these daily household handcraft skills to make them sources of earning.

3 Context -

This practice helps in pedestalizing the ability or talent of the students to work. The students come ahead to work (especially manually) unhesitatingly driven by their inner spirit for competition. The majority of our college's disciples comprise students from rural areas. Most of them belong to proletariat section of the society who earns their bread daily with sweat and blood. Keeping in mind the interests of students belonging to such sections of the society, our college provides guidance (other than academic) to these students with time to time so that this guidance can benefit them at some point of time in near future.

4 The Practice -

With the purpose of overall personality development of the students, many such training camps and workshops are organized in our college which will definitely prove beneficial for students in their future. Especially the NSS units running in the college, they keep on organizing such skill development oriented activities during their camps. In a 7 day NSS camp of Unit 4 (girls) organized during the session 2019-2020, girl students were motivated towards daily household chores which are otherwise seen as menial jobs. But under the expedition titled "Hunar" girl students were motivated by professionals. The girl students made pickles, sculptures from clay and also designed envelopes used on typical cultural occasions. These different handmade resources and tools were also presented on the last of the camp as exhibition. The students and teachers of the college bought useful items from this exhibition. The students can also get useful outcome out of this beyond mere learning. They also earned though a little. It was a wonderful sight to see the glowing faces of the students after this meager earning, for it had stroked a sense of confidence in them for hard work. 5 Evidence of Success: -

This practide (which was started with the motive of encouraging students towards learning remained a success. Our college encourages students especially belonging to the humble and downtrodden backgrounds) towards such handcraft skills so that they can be self-dependent when it comes to earning which will lighten the burden of their aged family members.
